



Making Connections: Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) Needs

Great Rivers 211's Partnership with the Wisconsin Information Referral Exchange (WIRE)

For more than twenty years, Great Rivers 211 and our partner centers across Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Iowa have supported <u>individuals</u> in accessing information and connecting with resources to meet their SDOH needs.

SDOH refers to the conditions in which people are born, grow, work, live, and age and the broader set of forces and systems shaping these conditions (Centers for Disease Control, 2022).

In Wisconsin, Great Rivers 211 is partnering with Wisconsin 211 and the United Way of Wisconsin for the Wisconsin Information Referral Exchange (WIRE), a tool designed to connect systems and communities better_to collaborate and share resources to meet SDOH needs.

The resources curated by Great Rivers 211 are integral elements of the WIRE tool. In December 2023, 211 Wisconsin launched a new healthcare provider SDOH resource navigation tool using WIRE and 211 to make it easier for healthcare providers to navigate and share local resources.



Great Rivers 211 database curators maintain a comprehensive, searchable online resource database with over 5,400 services, 2,569 sites, and 1798 agencies available at your fingertips.

Comprehensive means that a broad range of services are collected, including food, housing, shelter, transportation, utility assistance, financial assistance, support groups, mental health services, addiction services, health and human services programs, disaster, volunteer services, parenting support services, and many more.



Database curators consistently maintain information in collaboration with other 211 centers in Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Iowa and use the 211 Human Services Indexing System (211HSIS) to code services in a shared database.

Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) Gundersen Health System

Great Rivers 211 continues to partner with Gundersen Health System (GHS) and FindHelp, a social care network, on improving SDOH factors for GHS patients.

Great Rivers Hub Referrals

Great Rivers 211 began referring to our partner, The Great Rivers Hub. We connect pregnant people or residents of certain neighborhoods in La Crosse with a Community Health Worker from The Great Rivers Hub.

Coordinated Entry (CE) Referrals

Great Rivers 211 developed a partnership with Balance of State and local Community Action Program (CAP) agencies to connect people needing stable housing with CE programs in their area. People who contact Great Rivers 211 who need assistance finding stable housing are connected with their local CAP agency and other needed resources.

Where We Are Headed...

In 2024, Great Rivers 211 will continue to explore partnerships with other community-based organizations (CBOs) and healthcare partners. Additionally, we are steadfast in our commitment to providing reliable, confidential information and referral and supportive listening services, meeting or exceeding industry standards for call handling and database management.

In 2023, we continued exploring opportunities to support unsheltered people and the amazing CBOs supporting them. Team members participated in Point-in-Time Count activities to better understand the scope of homelessness in our communities. Three Great Rivers 211 team members participated in activities led collaboratively by the City and County of La Crosse to develop a long-term plan to address homelessness in the city of La Crosse. The final plan, *Pathways Home*, seeks to achieve functional zero homelessness in La Crosse by 2029.
